Welcome Diana Frade ~ *Nuestras Pequeñas Rosas*

On Thursday morning, we will welcome Dr. Diana Frade as our guest preacher in Marquand Chapel. Diana Dillenberger Frade is founder and director of *Nuestras Pequeñas Rosas*--Our Little Roses--a home for abandoned, abused and orphaned girls in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. The ministries of *Nuestras Pequeñas Rosas* include the home, which houses over 70 girls; Holy Family School, which provides bilingual education for 120 students; Our Little Rosas Clinic, which serves the poor of the city; and a housing project that provides homes for indigent single women who have been evicted from their dwellings.

Dr. Frade is known not only for her work in Honduras, but also for her efforts internationally as a defender of children. In October 2002 she was awarded a Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Berkeley Divinity School at Yale in recognition for her ministries.

This past summer, Spencer Reece (MDiv '11) had the opportunity to work with Dr. Frade. About his experience, he writes:

Honduras is the poorest speaking country in the Western Hemisphere. It is a hard country to live in... Less than two percent of Honduran women go on for higher education, and yet the orphanage

boasts of twelve college graduates, including one dentist and one engineer. This world is the one Dr. Paul Farmer embodies in Tracy Kidder's Mountains Beyond Mountains. What Dr. Paul Farmer did for AIDS in Haiti, Dr. Diana Frade is doing for young girls in Honduras, one orphaned girl at a time. It was a world of hope and for two blessed months I was a part of it. My time was inspired by the millennium development goals set by the United Nations, the

third of which is to promote gender equality and empower women. That's what happened there.

Diana Frade is married to Bishop Leo Frade of the Episcopal Diocese of Southeast Florida, previously Bishop of Honduras. The couple has four adult children and five grandchildren. We look forward to welcoming Dr. Frade to YDS.

Rev. Bill Goelderer ~ *Broad Street Ministry*

On Friday morning, we will welcome Rev. Bill Goelderer (M.Div. '96) as our guest preacher and presider in Marquand Chapel. Bill is the founding pastor and convener of the Broad Street Ministry in Philadelphia. BSM is an innovative ministry that emphasizes hospitable outreach, civic involvement, and creative expression. Prior to that, Bill served as the founding Director of the Center for Church Life at Auburn Theological Seminary in New York City where he was also a lecturer in Reformed theology at Union Theological Seminary whose campus Auburn shares. His work at Auburn also included creating opportunities for multi-faith understanding in our post-9/11 world, and addressing the coming crisis of leadership that will confront the church in the coming decades. Prior to that, Bill served as Associate Pastor for Youth, Young Adult and Public Church Ministry at the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Chicago.



His time there was spent mainly integrating the Gospel with the demands of everyday life through fellowship, advocacy/outreach programs, public forums, and discernment exercises. While serving in Chicago, Bill helped to found a national network of Presbyterian clergy under the age of 40--called the 7 percent. (The group takes its name from the statistic that only 7 percent of clergy currently serving the Presbyterian Church U.S.A are under the age of 40).

Prior to that, Bill was the Founding Director for Religious Outreach for The Interfaith Alliance in Washington D.C. This membership organization that has grown to over 150,000 members works to promote interfaith cooperation around shared

American values of civic participation, freedom of religion, diversity, and civility in public discourse and to encourage the active involvement of people of faith in the nation's political life.

In 2009, Bill extended his pastoral ministry in Philadelphia when he became the Pastor of Arch Street Presbyterian Church. Since 1851, Arch Street Presbyterian has been a worshipping congregation in the heart of Center City Philadelphia. Since Bill has arrived and assembled a dynamic team of lay and professional leadership, ASPC has undergone a rapid and dramatic revitalization. The congregation aims to be a dynamic Sunday morning worshipping community, a church that welcomes children and families of every configuration, a church that meets the needs of the people who work in the buildings around it (and those who wish they were employed there) as well as a center for arts and culture.

Please join us for Community Eucharist on Friday morning, led by the Presbyterian and Reformed Students, to welcome Rev. Bill Goelderer to Marquand Chapel.
