Professional experience: a narrative:

My teaching includes courses on the United Nations and Collective Security, International Organizations, International Law, Peacemaking and Negotiation, United Nations Peacekeeping and International Security. I have been teaching at Yale University as a Lecturer since the spring 1996.

In addition to being appointed at City College as the Yolanda Moses Scholar in 2004 and now Director of the Multilateralism and International Organization Initiative of the Colin Powell Center, I am also a Distinguished Fellow at International Security Studies at Yale University where I am conducting research and writing on international politics, international organization, and international law. I am currently the principal investigator of a joint project between Yale University and the City College of New York to organize and publish the papers of UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan.

In 2005 and 2006, I have conducted research for the Best Practices Section of the UN Department of Peacekeeping Operations through which I carried out a series of Public Opinion Surveys in Sierra Leone, Liberia, and Burundi to gather the opinions of the general public toward the work of the UN peacekeeping missions deployed in their countries. These publications are on the UN's website.

From 1998 to July 2003, I served as the Executive Director of the Academic Council on the United Nations System (ACUNS), headquartered at Yale University. Created in 1987, ACUNS is a membership organization of some 900 academics and practitioners who focus on international issues and the United Nations and is governed by a Board of Directors. During that period, I planned and organized annual international conferences and organized a series of two-week workshops each summer over a period of 6 years in cooperation with the American Society of International Law (ASIL) in which we continued to develop a greater interdisciplinary relationship between international law and international politics. The workshops focused on human rights, humanitarian intervention, and UN peacekeeping efforts at mediation and reconciliation.

I have produced and directed a documentary film on the history of United Nations peacekeeping called *Uncertain Soil: The Story of United Nations Peacekeeping*. This one hour and 50 minute film uses original footage as well as UN archival film along with video interviews of key experts to tell the story. I also produced a film on the founding of the United Nations based on the oral history interviews conducted through the Yale project and the writing of the occasional paper on the founding of the UN. I collected photos for the film which almost exclusively utilizes still photos taken in 1944 - 45 at Dumbarton Oaks, San Francisco, and other locations. Both films are available through ACUNS.

Before coming to Yale University, I was program officer for United Nations Peacekeeping and Collective Security at Parliamentarians for Global Action, an NGO headquartered in New York City. There I worked with members of parliament from around the world on issues related to the UN and peacekeeping. At Global Action, I organized a project in conflict resolution training for members of parliament in South Asia. We worked in consultation with the Harvard Project on Conflict Resolution with Ms. Eileen Babbitt and with the Children's Aid Society with William Weisberg. We held a planning meeting of the Steering committee of

regional leaders to launch the project in May 1994 and we held the first in a series of conflict resolution workshops in South Asia in the Maldives in May 1995. I was responsible for all the planning and for directing the workshops.
